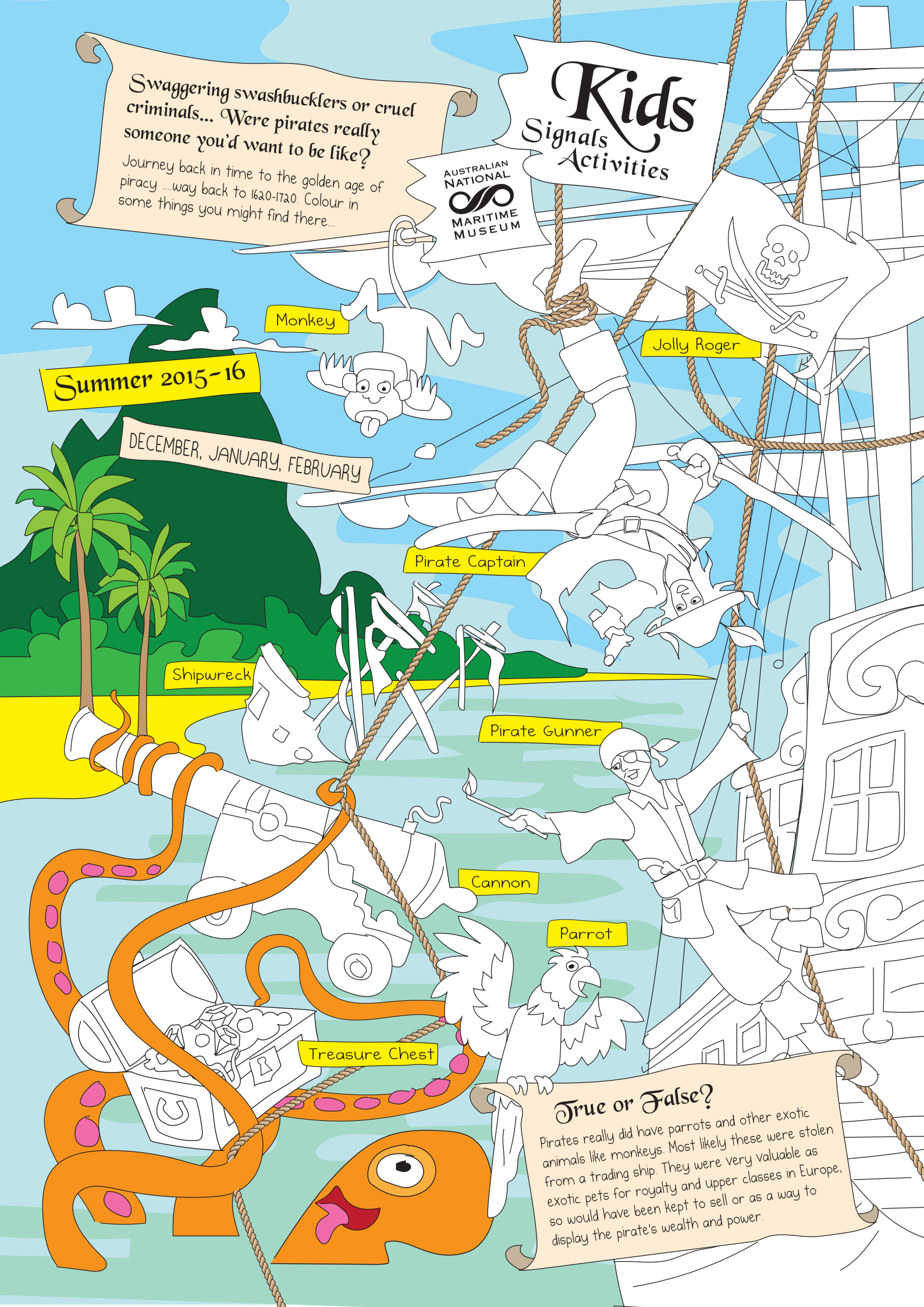

True or False?

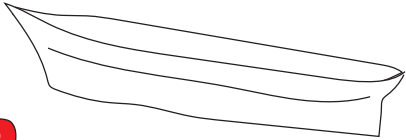

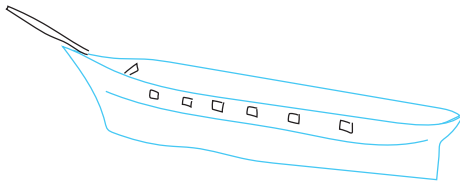
How to draw a Pirate's ship

Follow these simple steps to draw a full rigger, a kind of tall ship a pirate would like to steal

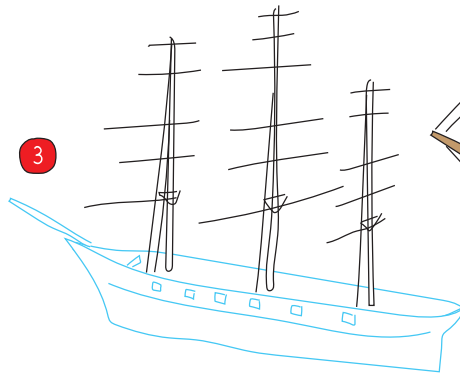
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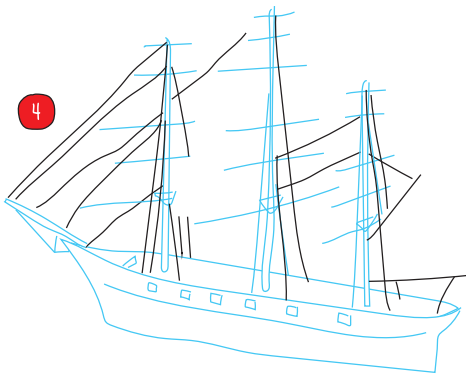


