The Museum welcomes local, interstate, and international visitors as well as 13,000 members, over 30,000 school students and hundreds of passionate volunteers. Combined, they regularly enjoy special events, activities and participate in the Museum's educational programs.

Position Overview

The Curator, Naval Heritage and Archaeology is a member of the Knowledge team, which encompasses the Museum's curators, library and publications. Reporting to the Manager, Maritime Archaeology, the position contributes to the Museum's strategic objective to be acknowledged as the nation's leading authority on maritime heritage, both within Australia and abroad. The role is focused on naval connections to Australia, including its home waters and overseas deployments, from the eighteenth century to the present. It entails an active program of maritime archaeology, including participation in underwater expeditions and the appropriate publication of findings. The position contributes significantly to maintaining a close relationship with the Royal Australian Navy (RAN), Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) and other external stakeholders. The Curator, Naval Heritage and Archaeology provides advice to the Museum's Executive on matters relating to naval affairs and is responsible for aspects of the National Maritime Collection relating to Australia's naval heritage. The position takes a leading role in interpreting the Museum's naval collection and ensuring that key commemorative dates are appropriately observed.

Key Responsibilities

- Represent the Museum in all matters relating to naval history, including the Royal Navy's presence in Australian waters from 1770 onwards, plus the past, present and future capabilities of the RAN.
- Provide expert knowledge and advice relating to the history and heritage of the RAN to museum audiences and other stakeholders, including the DVA and the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.
- Serve as a primary contact between the Museum and the RAN, including participation in events, ceremonies, and non-operational deployments.
- Prepare proposals and advise on submissions for naval-related accessions into the National Maritime Collection, including both physical and digital materials, in line with the Museum's Collection Development Policy, priority collection focus areas, and Protection of Cultural Objects on Loan (PCOL) protocols.
- Lead the interpretation of the Museum's naval materials, including decommissioned and replica naval assets, objects in the National Maritime Collection, and related on-site and online exhibitions.
- Actively plan and deliver maritime archaeology programs related to naval vessels and engagements, including underwater surveys and collaborative research projects, both within and beyond Australian waters.
- Support the broader activities of the Museum's maritime archaeology unit by participating in unit projects and programs, as well as regular underwater diving activities, training, and maintaining all relevant qualifications.
- Engage stakeholders and audiences through innovative exhibitions and emerging technologies to highlight the contribution of naval technologies, capabilities and personnel to Australian history.
- Represent the Museum in public forums, media opportunities, conferences, and cultural institutions networks.
- Research and publish accounts of Australian naval history and maritime archaeology in scholarly, public and specialist forums.

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Position Overview

The position is a senior leadership role in the Knowledge team tasked with the management and ongoing development of the museum's maritime archaeology program. The Manager Maritime Archaeology Program plans and leads maritime archaeology projects, team members, equipment, budget and project collaborations. The position provides expert advice across the museum on matters relevant to maritime archaeology and a leading role in acquiring, researching and interpreting the maritime archaeology collection through exhibitions, digital and online programs. The position has a significant role in museum policy, including remaining abreast of relevant maritime archaeology legislation and Protection of Cultural Objects on Loan (PCOL) protocols. The role includes proposing and assessing acquisitions for the National Maritime Collection, plus external loans and high-level donation opportunities. In addition, the role includes line management of the Library Coordinator and oversight of the Museum's Vaughan Evans Library, including collection development and facilities management. In the longer term, it is expected that the position holder will work with the museum's Digital team to develop and maintain a dedicated and vibrant online resource that reflects and showcases the museum's work in maritime archaeology.

Key Responsibilities

- Lead and develop maritime archaeology activities at the museum through engagement in national and international projects through archaeological fieldwork and historical research, in conjunction with key stakeholders and national and international archaeological collaborations.
- Manage the development of a 'centre of excellence' in maritime archaeology by furthering research activities that support and complement broader national maritime heritage efforts.
- Actively plan and deliver maritime archaeology programs, including underwater surveys and collaborative research projects, both within and beyond Australian waters.
- Manage the budget and maintain diving and maritime archaeology equipment according to relevant safety standards and the museum's maritime archaeology policy and procedures, including training and maintaining relevant qualifications.
